

YLT 2024

- All young people living in N.I. who receive child benefit and celebrated their 16th birthday in Dec 2023 – Feb 2024 (6,261)
- Split online survey
- 2,210 completions
- Response rate 36%

- All P7-aged children in N.I.
- Informed consent from principals/parents/guardians (opt-out) and children
- Online survey completed in school
- 4,360 completions
- Response rate schools 20%
- Response rate children 17%








Happiness in school (KLT)

What three words come first to your mind when thinking about the NI school system?






Divided school system in NI



Religious composition of school attended, by religious background (%)










Divided school system in NI (YLT)



Type of school attended, by family-financial background (%)










Mixed-religion preferences KLT over time (YLT)












Government should encourage & support integrated education, by religion (%)












Government should promote & support integrated education, by family-financial background (%)












Should your current school be integrated? By respondent's religious background (%)












Should your current school be integrated? By family-financial background (%)












SHARED EDUCATION encourages schools to work together and partner with other schools where the pupils are from a different religious background, to include both Protestant and Catholic pupils. Such sharing has to take place on a REGULAR AND CONTINUED BASIS over the academic year. It cannot just be a joint Christmas concert or joint sports day. To count as Shared Education pupils might, for example, have classes or do projects with pupils from another school, or share computers or sports facilities on a regular basis. (YLT wording)










Respondents saying they liked these activities 'a little' or 'a lot' (%)












I am better able to respect the view of others as a result of taking part in SE (%)












How respondents felt overall about Shared Education (%)












Respondents in favour of these elements of a shared campus (%)










Is religion always going to make a difference... in NI? (YLT)















Where did the violence occur? (%) (YLT)







Children's mobile phone & internet use (KLT)



- 87% of KLT respondents own a personal mobile phone (92% in 2008 and 90% in 2013)
- 84% say they use the internet on their phone 'almost every day'
- 88% say they use the internet at home 'almost every day'
- 97% say they have been taught how to be safe online in the last year (93% in 2013)
- 51% say they can access the internet whenever they want
- Only 13% say their parents know 'nothing' or 'just a little about what they are doing on the internet

My Grief: My Choice Young people's attitudes to grief education and bereavement support in schools

Introduction


COVID-19 brought death, directly and indirectly, into the lives of people around the world on a scale most could never have imagined. In Northern Ireland (NI), between March 2020 to the end of 2022, over 4,000 more deaths occurred than would normally be expected for that period (NISRA, 2023). However, it was not simply the number of people who were dying that was so distressing, but also the circumstances in which they had to face death and the impact their family and friends. The inability to be with loved ones in their final hours, to attend a funeral, to experience the physical support of family and friends had a profoundly negative impact on the bereaved. Children and young people were arguably the forgotte generation at this time, including with respect to bereavement (NICCY, 2021). (41%), followed by secondary school


(35%) is the point at which a child is most likely to experience a death of someone significant in their lives for the first time; most commonly through the death of a grandparent (71%) (Goss at a 1.024). However, it is also estimated that each year 1,600 parents in Northern Ireland die leaving dependent school aged children (Childhood Bereavement Network, 2021).

Beresvement is complex and each person's experience unique - age when beresved, relationship with the person that has died, and the circumstances of the death will all have an impact on the grieving process. As a society there is much that we can do to support each other through beresvement, and the landmark report published by the UK Commission on Beresvement following have provided to the procession of the procession of

(UK Commission on Bereavement, 2022). It said that all deutation providers should be required to have a bereavement policy, provide staff training, have processes for supporting bereaved pupils and provide ge-epropriate opportunities for children and young people to learn about coping with death and bereavement. In NI, we have progress to make to realise these recommendations in full.

With funding from Marie Curie as part of its Schools Beresvement Programmed the 2024 Young Life and Times (YLT) survey included some questions asking 16-year-disk how they feel schools could or should prepare and support young people to ded with death and grief - a life event they will face at some point.
